

As Chinadialogue points out, the chemical plant's parent company, Jiangsu Tianjiayi Chemical Co. Ltd., failed to take action even after receiving numerous fines and violation records. A February 2018 report from the State Administration of Work Safety lists 13 different types of safety hazards for the facility, including unqualified personnel, leakages, a lack of safety valves and inadequate emergency measures for handling flammable gas. Preliminary speculation from those with knowledge of site point to toxic benzene tanks as the cause of the explosion, a primary source of reprimand in the 2018 report. On the Blue Map Database, IPE found nine additional environmental violation records for Tianjiayi Chemicals since 2013 (eight since 2016), totaling fines of RMB 1.79 million. These


records indicate similar subversive behavior toward environmental regulation, with the company setting up secret pipelines and avoiding supervision over air pollutants and solid

Two Sessions Calls for Simultaneous Action on the Economy and Environment

The Two Sessions – annual meetings of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Congress (CPPCC) and the National People's Congress (NPC) - commenced in early March and announced the central government's policy priorities for the coming year. In

based on performance. However, this does not mean a relaxation of standards; on the contrary, as environmental governance moves to align with economic goals through green credit and green finance, consistent compliance will become a powerful business

While IPE applauded the central environmental inspections carried out by both central and local governments between 2016 and 2018, we also witnessed abrupt factory

closures or orders to halt production, which can interrupt global supply chains and interfere with overall economic development and social stability. IPE therefore works with brands to encourage industrial facilities to keep close track of their own environmental performance and actively provide public explanations regarding the status of their compliance or corrective actions to update other stakeholders, particularly banks, clients and the media. Timely and accessible information and accountability are no longer simply about consumer image, but ultimately more so the standard for businesses to stay ahead of a rapidly changing market. Since 2007, we have commended the leadership of brands who make full use of public data for supply chain management and we call for others to join these frontrunners and together redefine the standards for the entire industry to level the playing field in favor of environmental stewardship.
